HOUSING & HOMELESSNESS

Access to safe, affordable housing that meets the diverse needs of a community is a key measure of a successful and equitable community.

Housing supply, rental and mortgage stress are key issues in our region.

Only 0.7% of rental properties were vacant in Feb 2022. There are 6.261 residences listed on AirBNB, of which 87% are entire homes or apartments.

HOMELESSNESS





The homeless population grew by 15% over five vears, three times the growth rate of the region's total population. 1,496 people were homeless on Census night in 2016.

A CRISIS AT HOME

The Northern Rivers community has long experienced housing and homelessness issues, and these have been exacerbated by recent events including bushfires, a global pandemic, and multiple significant floods in the early months of 2022.

Whilst recovery work is already commencing, there is an urgent need to work with community members to better understand housing and homelessness needs, and to support organisations in prioritising and coordinating response. The Northern Rivers Community Foundation is undertaking a strategic research project, aiming to bring the private and public sector together, with the community to work towards regional housing and homelessness solutions. We look forward to sharing the findings with our community for a stronger, more equitable future.

ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY

Our economy, social connectivity and cultural identity are reliant upon the region's natural resources. How we manage and protect these systems determines their sustainability and our own.

WEATHER & CLIMATE

Maximum temperatures, rainfall and fire-weather risk are all projected to worsen in the Northern Rivers by 2070, increasing the risk of weather related disasters.

WASTE & RECYCLING



Waste per household is higher in the Northern Rivers (24.04 kg per household per week) than NSW (21.88kg).



Nearly **60% of Northern Rivers** waste is recycled (44% in NSW), with approximately **5kg** per person per week **going to landfill**.

RENEWABLE ENERGY



1 in 2 dwellings have solar installations, compared to 1 in 3 for NSW.

EMISSIONS



57% of emissions are from electricity and 12% from agriculture. All regions except Kyogle (27.1%) and Richmond Valley (17.3%) have **lower emissions than NSW** (16.4%) and AU average (16.9%).

BUSHFIRES AND FLOODS

The Northern Rivers NSW has experienced catastrophic bushfires and flood events in recent years that have had significant impact environmentally, economically and socially.

The impact of the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires in the Northern Rivers was 8,120 km2 of burnt land, 39% of all land in the region. Clarence Valley and Richmond Valley were disproportionately affected in terms of burnt land. The economic impact was \$370.3 million.

Our region is currently recovering from the February and March 2022 flooding, where numerous rainfall and river height records were broken. In response, the Northern Rivers Community Foundation, in partnership with the Byron Community Centre, launched the Flood Relief Fund to offer quick response grants of up to \$10,000 to community organisations to provide flood relief and



recovery for the Northern Rivers. Within six weeks of the floods, almost a million dollars in grant funding was distributed to more than 100 community organisations supporting recovery efforts on the ground across the region. Find out more here:

Northern Rivers residents are at higher risk of health-related characteristics such as obesity, sedentary behaviour and higher alcohol consumption than NSW or Australia.



Northern Rivers residents recorded higher rates of psychological distress compared to NSW or Australia. (Rate per 100 residents aged 18+)


