

**Summary of Key Findings** 

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#### **Overview**

For the past four years, the Northern Rivers Community Foundation (NRCF) has surveyed the community sector on their recovery from the 2022 floods and their contribution to disaster recovery and resilience in the Northern Rivers.

The 2025 survey was sent to 270 Northern Rivers-based not-for-profit organisations and groups between 3rd March to 13 April 2025. At the conclusion of the survey period a total of 128 responses were received.

This report presents a summary of key findings from the survey and provides insights into the critical role that small community-based organisations play in supporting disaster response, recovery and resilience and the challenges they face.




# To what extent have community organisations recovered following the 2022 Floods? What are the key challenges that remain?

The survey results showed that while community organisations were gradually recovering from the impact of the 2022 floods, the impact of the disaster was still being felt.

77% of survey respondents reported that their organisation was impacted by the 2022 floods.







# To what extent did community organisations in the Northern Rivers contribute to disaster response and recovery efforts following the 2022 Floods?

The survey results showed that the majority community organisations who responded reported that they continue to be engaged in disaster recovery and resilience work, even when it is not their core mission or purpose.

## To what extent are community organisations being resourced to support their role in disaster response and recovery and how have funding patterns changed over time?


The survey results showed that 82% of community organisations reported experiencing at least one barrier to contributing to disaster response. The most significant barrier was insufficient resources and funding to do this work.




### How the amount of funding received to support disaster recovery and resilience has changed in the last 12 months.

More than three quarters (79%) of respondents said they had applied for funding to support their disaster recovery and resilience work since the 2022 floods, with the vast majority (92%) reporting that they had received funding from at least one source.

Of those organisations who had received funding for disaster response, recovery and resilience work since the 2022 floods, most said the amount of funding available had decreased significantly in the past 12 months.



The most common barrier reported in securing funding for disaster response, recovery and resilience was that it was not aligned with their needs or the programs and services they were offering.
